

FISCHER STICKS TO STATEMENT OF PREMONITION

Man Arrested in Hamilton Arrives in New York and Poses For Movie Men.

**PREDICTS THAT MORE
DISASTERS TO FOLLOW**

NEW YORK, Sept. 20.—The body of the one victim of the Wall street explosion, which had remained unidentified, was recognized at the morgue today by Mrs. Olive Kehrer, of Brooklyn, as her son, Elmer Wallace Kehrer, 21 years old, a chauffeur.

Kehrer had been out of work and looking for employment, Mrs. Kehrer said, adding that the youth had made his home with her at 422 South Fourth street.

Considerable importance had been attached to the fact that Kehrer had remained unidentified so long, official opinion differing over the theory that this lack of identification might signify fear to recognize him, by persons of questionable character.

Fischer Reaches New York.

Edwin P. Fischer, the former metropolitan tennis star, who was detained in Hamilton in connection with his post-card warning of the Wall street blast, arrived here this morning in the custody of New York and Hamilton detectives. He was taken to police headquarters at once.

Posed For the "Movies."

Fischer, after talking with a swarm of reporters and photographers while posing for news "movies" shoved his way with the detectives to a Lexington avenue lunch room where he breakfasted on beef stew and coffee, finishing the meal when he washed his face with a glass of water.

He stuffed into his pocket three cigars he picked up from the Grand Central floor, chuckling as he did so, and exclaiming that he did not smoke, but "his friends did."

When requested to talk he said: "I'm in the hands of my friends here," he added, referring to the detectives. "That's all I know. I don't know what sort of statement you fellows expect me to make. I don't know much to say."

Was Still Smiling.

Fischer's jocularly continued without let-up throughout the excitement of his arrival. When he disappeared from view down a subway entrance, he still was smiling as though he was enjoying himself thoroughly.

When detectives said they had to invoke the combined aid of the mayor, sheriff, crown attorney, chief of police, United States consul and the immigration authorities of both countries at Hamilton to get Fischer away, the former tennis star broke in:

"Yes, if it had not been for them I'd still be up in that darned place."

Persists in His Statement.

Fischer wore a grey suit and cap, both wrinkled by travel. He was clean shaven, but needed a hair cut. He carried a small black handbag. Department of Justice agents accompanied him and the detectives to police headquarters.

Fischer stuck to his statement that "it was premonition" that warned him in advance of the Wall street explosion, adding:

"More will happen in the future. Unseen powers have communicated that through me."

The detectives who brought him here from Hamilton explained that Fischer invariably had made the same assertions in reply to their questions throughout the trip, adding that he was a "friend of the under-dog."
