WILL RAISE BARRIERS AGAINST UNDESIRABLES

NEW LEGISLATION TO BE ENACTED BY CONGRESS TO GUARD U.S. CITIZENSHIP

Washington, Nov. 15.—The safeguarding of American citizenship and the raising of effective barriers against admission of undesirable aliens through new legislation to be enacted during the approaching short session of Congress were planned to-day by members of the House Immigration and Naturalization Committee at a special meeting called by the Chairman, Congressman Albert Johnson of Washington State.

Congressmen Johnson, Siegel, Knutsen, Box and Welty, members of the committee, left last night for an inspection of immigration conditions at Ellis Island, the immigration station at New York.

Reports have come to the committee that because of the great rush of immigrants and lack of adequate facilities at Ellis Island the existing immigration laws are not being enforced as rigidly against undesirables as demanded by some members of the committee.

SAY ROBBERY MAY BE MILLION

Checking Up Huge Haul Made by Train Bandits

Washington, Nov. 15.—While Chicago banks were busy to-day checking up pending consignments of gold and securities from San Francisco, Postoffice Inspectors, Secret Service Agents and Bureau special police here, in Omaha, and Kansas City were attempting to solve the spectacular raid on a trans-continental mail car yesterday in Council Bluffs, Iowa.
