

## WOODMEN'S CONCERT FOR PATRIOTIC FUND

### INCIDENT AT EXHIBITION — MOVEMENT TO STRENGTHEN THEIR ORDER.

The Canadian Order Woodmen of the World held an open-air concert at their tent on the Exhibition grounds last evening, giving the proceeds, a voluntary collection, to the Patriotic Fund.

### REFUSED TO SIGN PAPERS.

#### Young German Reservist Sent to Fort Henry From Orangeville.

Orangeville, Sept. 8.—Alfred Boppell, a young German reservist, was arrested yesterday by Chief of Police Marshall, acting under special instructions following his report to Inspector Sherwood of Ottawa. Boppell, who has been employed at the Melville stone quarries, near here, recently reported to the German Consul at Toronto, having been called home to join the colors. He was unable to get out of the country, and returned here. He was discharged from his position, and since has been under surveillance under the regulations respecting foreigners. He refused to sign the necessary papers entitling him to his parole. He was therefore taken into custody, brought before Magistrate Pattullo, and remanded to jail. This morning he was taken by two officers of the Royal Grenadiers to Kingston, where he will be interned at Fort Henry.

### GERMANS GOING EAST.
