KICK AGAINST SQUIRE COHEN.

Jewish Magistrate Criticized by Miss Rae Levinsky and Rabbi Price.

Miss Rae Levinsky appeared before the Board of Control yesterday and protested against Chief of Police Grasett referring her to Magistrate Cohen for permission to conduct a "tag day" in the interests of the Jewish poor. Miss Levinsky, in company with Rabbi Price of the University Avenue Synagogue, declared Magistrate Cohen had blocked them in their efforts to do something in the interest of charity.

Miss Levinsky told the Controllers the "tag day" would be conducted amongst the Jewish citizens of the city. The Jewish poor need shoes. The board deputed Controller Thompson to take the deputation to Chief Grasett, but the latter told them to take the matter up with the Police Commissioners on Tuesday next.

HUNGARIAN SUBJECTS ARRESTED AT BELLEVILLE

THEY CLAIMED TO BELONG TO A
SERBIAN PROVINCE—SENT TO
FORT HENRY.

Belleville, March 2.—Eleven Hungarians were arrested by military and police authorities at 2 o'clock this morning at the Grand Trunk and Canadian Northern stations. It had been learned that some **alien enemies** were about to leave the city on their way out of Canada, as there was no work for them here. The prisoners included one woman. They acknowledged being Hungarian subjects, but claimed

to be natives of a Serbian province now part of Austria-Hungary.

This afternoon, after advice from headquarters, nine of them were sent under military escort to Fort Henry, Kingston. The remaining two, a man and his wife, were paroled.

Buffalo and Detroit were their proposed destinations.
