SERVICE MEDALS AWARDED

Affiliation of Grenadiers With Prince of Wales' Regiment Approved

According to regimental orders of the Royal Grenadiers, the approval of His Majesty has been given to the alliance of the Toronto corps and the 100th Winnipeg Grenadiers with the Prince of Wales Leinster Regiment. The Leinster Regiment is known as the Royal Canadians, having been raised in Canada in 1857 for service in the Indian mutiny, and accordingly the affiliation of the Grenadiers with it is regarded as appropriate. All the local infantry units are now affiliated with units of the Imperial army.

In the same regimental orders details are given of the separation allowances payable by the Dominion Government to the families of officers and men who have gone to the front.
