

German Professors At the University

Speakers at Norway Conservatives' Annual Revert to This Subject

The Norway Conservative Association at its annual meeting held last night at the Paris hall, Norway, elected the following officers for 1915: Honorary presidents, Mr. J. A. Macdonald, K.C., and Mr. George Shields; president, Mr. A. H. Dunnett, B.A.; first vice-president, Mr. J. H. Lennox; second vice-president, Mr. T. Adams; third vice-president, Mr. H. West; secretary-treasurer, Mr. A. Rolls. The following captains of subdivisions, together with the officers of the association, constitute the executive committee: Messrs. Young, Jr., Cottrell, Rolls, Booth, Walter, Vigue, Knowles, Ryder, Lye, Oliver, Cosgrove and Bogan.

As pointed out by the newly-elected president, Mr. Dunnett, the association has doubled its membership in the past year, having increased from fifty to one hundred members.

Several well-known gentlemen addressed the meeting. Mr. J. A. Macdonald, K.C., spoke on the alien problem. He said that he considered employment of German professors in the University of Toronto a disgrace and he did not understand the Government permitting it.

Dr. Gilmour Steele expressed a similar view, stating that all un-naturalized German teachers employed in the schools should be dismissed.

Other speakers were Mr. J. H. Lennox, Alderman Robbins and Mr. W. F. Orr, who dealt chiefly with the forthcoming local elections.
