

SWIMMERS SET FOUR NEW WORLD'S RECORDS

Chicago, Feb. 5.—Four new world's records were set last night in the Central Amateur Athletic Union swimming championship events, and fifteen American marks were broken. Harry Hebner, Derry McGilivray and Michael McDermott were the main factors in the meet.

McDermott set a world's mark of 1.13 2-4 for 100 yards in retaining the 200 yards breast stroke title, and made a new record for the 200 yards of 2.38 2-5, clipping two seconds off his own record. McGilivray, in defending the 300 yards open swim title set a new mark of 2.50 1-5 for the 250 yards and created one of 3.26 1-5 for the 300 yards. The old world's records were 2.51 for 250 yards and 3.26 2-5 for 300 yards both by J. G. Hatfield of England. The best previous American mark for 250 yards was 2.52 3-5 by McGilivray.

Hebner, in the 880 yards, broke ten American records, beginning at 330 yards. His time for the 880 yards was 11.14 1-5 the former record of 11.29 1-5 being held by C. M. Daniels.

AUSTRIAN RESERVIST AT PUMPING STATION

HE WAS INTERNED AND SO WAS
FRIEND WHO SOUGHT HIS
RELEASE.

Josef Kulaz, an Austrian reservist, was interned in Stanley Barracks yesterday for loitering in a suspicious manner at the pumping station at the foot of John street on Thursday night. He was captured by the military guard, and stated that he was looking for work. The sum of \$125 was found in his pockets, and it transpired that he had been distributing his money freely among his friends. He had not registered and when questioned he stated that he was not a reservist, but when his lodgings were searched at 53 Dundas street an army book was discovered, among other documents which are being examined by an interpreter.

Ludwig Galeski, who lived with Kulaz, came to the registrar's office to try and secure his friend's release, but the visit resulted in his own capture, and he now resides at Stanley Barracks. Kulaz is 33 years of age, and is said to be a man of good education.

DIED IN DENTIST'S CHAIR.

Quebec, Feb. 5.—While having a tooth pulled at a dentist's yesterday at St. Tite de Champlain, Que., Sister Magdalen of the Sacred Heart suddenly collapsed and died, despite all the efforts of the best medical aid. She belonged to Limoilou, near Quebec, where the body arrived to-day.

TWO CHINESE ELECTROCUTED

New York, Feb. 5.—Lee Dock and Eng Hing, two Chinese, were put to death in the electric chair at Sing Sing prison early to-day. Both Chinese were members of the Hi Sing Tong. They were convicted of the murder of Leo Kay, the aged leader of the On Leong Tong, on Feb. 17, 1912, during a long war in this city, and following the murder of Hip Pon Sing, a Hip Sing member.
