

# DISCHARGE ALIENS FROM MUNITION WORKS

## Mayor Intends Conferring With Labor Minister

## RECEIVED MANY PROTESTS

### City Commissioners Oppose Lacrosse Club's Request for Exclusive Use of Rosedale Lacrosse Grounds — Want Street Car Line Extended.

Mayor Church will present a resolution to-day for the approval of the Board of Control asking the Dominion Government to order munition manufacturers to discharge all **alien enemies** employed in their works. At the Board of Control yesterday his Worship said he had received many letters protesting against the employment of **aliens** in munition factories. He had taken the matter up with Mr. Flavelle of the Munitions Board, and was informed that he had no power to act. The Mayor intends conferring with the Minister of Labor on the matter.

### Against Special Privileges.

Toronto Lacrosse Club's request for the exclusive use of the Rosedale Lacrosse Grounds, recently taken over by the city, is strongly opposed by Commissioners Forman, Bradshaw and Chambers. A recommendation was sent to the Board of Control yesterday by these Commissioners against permitting the use of the grounds by the club.

"If the proposal is to permit special interests to have special privileges, then, in our opinion, the property is dear at any price, and should not have been acquired," said the report. "The effect would be that the general body of taxpayers would be at the expense of paying for it, and providing moneys for its upkeep, and would not have free use of it." They recommended that the property be treated like all other park property.

The Board of Control agreed with the sentiment expressed by the Commissioners, and referred a renewed application from the club to the Parks Committee.

### Bloor Street Line.

Mr. D'Arcy Hinds, heading a deputation from Ward Seven, asked the Board of Control yesterday to support a proposal to extend the Bloor street civic car line as far as Runnymede road. In regard to the objec-

tion on the ground of expense. Mr. Hinds said: "We in Ward Seven have never objected to a fare large enough to pay expenses." Works Commissioner Harris was asked to-day to report on the proposed extension.
