

JASPER INTERNMENT CAMP CLOSED; PRISONERS AT WORK

Jasper Park internment camp has been closed, the guards have returned to the city, and twenty-two of the prisoners whose conduct showed them to be dangerous and belonging to the irreconcilable class have been sent to Lethbridge internment camp for confinement.

There were originally 208 enemy subjects interned; of these 100 were allowed out to work for the C.P.R.; 30 for the G.T.P.; 25 in Mountain Park coal mine; and the balance, excluding the 22 referred to, are at work for farmers in various parts of the province. The guards are under orders to report

at the 19th armory on Tuesday. Many are returned soldiers, some having been in the fighting line others having got as far as England when they were sent back as being medically unfit. None of them has got a discharge and they are in somewhat of a quandry as to what arrangements will be made for their future employment. They appear to be under the impression that their term of service as guards was to be until the end of the war. There prevails the impression that the majority of the men will have the opportunity of going to Lethbridge for guard duty.
