

OUR INTERNED ALIENS.

Who would not be an alien enemy? The report of the Senate on the operation of internment camps shows that the camp at Amherst cost last year \$202,393.40; that at Banff, \$93,471.61; Brandon \$51,898.54; Edgewood \$30,612.67; Halifax \$17,963.78; Jasper \$26,153.61; Kapushing \$160,535.93; Kingston \$91,618.17; Lethbridge \$19,325.22; Mara Lake \$60,683.17; Petawawa \$14,520.49; Vernon \$100,616.12; and Spirit Lake Camp, \$108,060.89.

Among the delicacies supplied to the camps, according to the report, are lobster, asparagus, chutney sauce, mango, taploca, salmon, tomato catsup, brandy, cognac, eggs, bacon, sauerkraut and parsnips. The marmalade and jam cost runs up to over \$10,000.

Between this treatment of interned Germans and their countrymen's treatment of British prisoners there is a wide contrast.
