

GERMAN PRISONERS ESCAPE.

Six Get Away From Detention Camp at Lethbridge.

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

Lethbridge, Alta., April 30.—Six German prisoners have made a sensational escape from the detention camp here, tunneling a passage four and a half feet underground and 110 feet long leading from the bunk house under the compound fence to the centre of the city nurseries adjoining the camp. No trace of their whereabouts has yet been received. The prisoners used implements stolen from the kitchen in the work of tunneling, used a mine fan made by one of them for supplying them with air while tunneling and made candles out of grease and tallow. Each man who escaped carried a knapsack with provisions saved from the daily meals or stolen from the kitchen.

WABASH PAYMASTER DEAD.

W. H. Miller Dies in St. Louis on Eve of His Wedding.

St. Louis, Mo., April 30.—W. H. Miller, General Paymaster of the Wabash Railroad, died of appendicitis at a St. Louis hospital early to-day. He was to wed Miss Mary E. Donnelly, 1,328 Goodfellow avenue, to-morrow night.

Saturday noon the stricken man had requested his brother to procure the marriage license so the wedding might be performed on time. Knowing his serious condition, the brother decided to wait.

Friends of the paymaster all along the Wabash road were planning to celebrate the wedding of "good old Bill." All plans have been cancelled.
