

CRIMINAL SESSION TO OPEN HERE ON TUESDAY, SEPT. 16

Mr. Justice Hyndman to Preside —Interesting Local Cases to Come Before Court

The criminal sessions of the Supreme Court will be held here on Tuesday, September 16th, with Mr. Justice Hyndman presiding. Among the cases to be tried are the following:

T. N. McCormack, former station agent at Coaldale, charged with stealing two bottles of liquor from a box car. This is the aftermath of the notorious case known as the Taber liquor case where liquor was taken from a box car on the siding at Coaldale by parties who drove in from Taber.

Russell Nilsson, of Raymond, for the theft of a ring from Albert H. Nilsson.

Joe Foss, of Milk River, for illicit connection with a girl, hitherto chaste, of 14 years and under 16 years.

Joseph Wocknitz and Nick Leismester of Mapraeth, for assisting one, Edward Gumschke, an alien enemy on parole, to escape from the place where he was supposed to be at large.

James Smith, of Woolford, for doing grievous bodily harm to J. Woolford, Jr.

J. Paulenko for fraudulently converting to his own use moneys received the property of Peter Dohee, at present undergoing imprisonment at the penitentiary at Edmonton for complicity in the murder of Onofrychuk in which Pete Paulenko was the principal and whose sentence of hanging was commuted to imprisonment for life.

Clarence Galloway, of Champion, for the theft of six pigs, the property of Thomas S. Clifford.

Niel Nielson, of Taber, for stealing six heifers, the property of C. J. Franklic.

Charles Goddard, of Kellaw, for the theft of automobile accessories, the property of Mulroy Donald.

Mrs. Catherine Smith, of Lethbridge, for committing perjury in respect to a loan of \$500 received by her from W. Albert Fools.

Ray Nielson of Warner, for damaging two bulls by maiming them.

Newton Morgan of Milk River, for the theft of a bay gelding the property of Thomas Turnbull.

Arthur Olson, of Coats, for sending a letter threatening to burn the Verburg school house and the occupants thereof.

Wasył Szologan for assault on his wife Anne.

In addition to the above, there are two certiorari cases. In one, Ralph Minor seeks for a quashing of a conviction against him and the refund of a fine imposed by Justices of Peace Godfrey and Biingham for an indecent assault committed on a girl. In the other, Blanche Moran and Madeline Sorrel ask for a quashing of the conviction at the city police court of the former for being the keeper and the latter an inmate of a disorderly house on Third Avenue South, when they were respectively fined \$125 and \$25 each.
