## BIG RUSH OF ALIENS FOR WORK ON FARMS

Over 800 Permits Granted at the Registration Office in City.

Over 800 applications were dealt with at the alien registration office yesterday from foreigners anxious to work in the harvest fields. The officials had a strenuous time of it, but the work was got through with great despatch, in the circumstances, and the applicants went away quite satisfied.

Almost without exception, the men were Austrians, whose chief anxiety is not the progress of the war, but the obtaining of work.

Many men are arriving daily from Fort William, Port Arthur, Fort Frances. Kenora, and other eastern points. These men have been granted per-

mission by the authorities of their home towns to proceed to Winnipeg in search of employment. On arrival here, their cards are franked by the registrar and permission extended to proceed to the respective points where work is plentiful.

Not only is the problem of unemployment being solved by the farmers' demand for labor, but large gangs of men have proceeded to Edmonton, Coalspur, Fort Saskatchewan, Medicine Hat and Canora in order to engage on work on the various railroads.

The public is assured that every pre-
