

UNEMPLOYED TO CALL ON ROBLIN

Will March in Body to Parliament Buildings Unless Works Are Re-opened

Work has ceased on the parliament buildings and new court house and some 500 skilled men have been thrown out of employment. The work closed down yesterday and now these men are seeking other employment, which, it is generally admitted, is exceedingly scarce.

This is due to the decision of the provincial government that no more money shall be spent out of capital account until the war has been settled. It is understood that Thomas Kelly, the contractor, has made a proposition to the government to supply all necessary material if the government will come through with the wages. This offer, it is said, has been rejected.

Today the executive of the Trades and Labor council, with business agents of the unions affected, will wait on Sir Rodmond Roblin, asking that the work be reopened. Yesterday a delegation waited on the premier without success.

If this fails to have the desired effect it is proposed to call a meeting of the unemployed in Market Square and from there march in a body to see Sir Rodmond, no matter where he may be. Something is to be done in the matter at once.
