

TO ORGANIZE CITY FOR MORE RECRUITS

Toronto to be Divided in Dis- tricts and Regiment Assign- ed to Each

Recruiting in Toronto is to be further systematized. At a meeting of regimental officers yesterday it was decided that the work of recruiting sergeants should be directed by the Recruiting Depot. The city will be divided into 32 divisions, and two recruiting sergeants of a particular regiment will be assigned daily to each division. Each regiment will supply four sergeants in place of the ten which they send out at present. The sergeants will parade at the depot at 8 o'clock every morning, and will remain on duty till 6.30, so that they will be able to put the question to young men on their way home to supper. Each division will have an officer, and the intention is to have motor cars to call at these offices at stated times and take the men to the central depot.

Recruits Still Come.

The number of recruits attested for yesterday was 93, compared with 99 last Monday. Thirty-seven recruits were attested on Saturday, and 51 on Friday. A Government statement of the need for recruits would be welcomed by recruiting officers.

LIEUT. NOXON DROWNED.

Was Serving at Internment Camp at Kapuskasing.

On receipt of the news that their son, Lieut. Geor Courtland Noxon, had been drowned at Kapuskasing, Ont., on Saturday night, Mr. and Mrs. Noxon of 88 Madison avenue left for the north to bring the body back to Toronto. The body has not yet, however, been recovered.

Kapuskasing is a large Internment camp in northern Ontario. Young Noxon, who was only 19 years of age, had been an officer of the guard, but had expected to obtain an overseas commission shortly.
