

INTERNEED ALIENS WILL AID SEEDING CANADIAN FARMS

**Farmers Must Deposit \$2 and
Guarantee Work For Seven
Months**

Arrangements for the employment of interned aliens on the farms of western Canada were made at a conference held at the offices of J. Bruce Walker, commissioner of immigration, Saturday afternoon. Among those in attendance were Major-Gen. Sir William D. Otter, K.C.B., R. MacKenzie, of the Manitoba Grain Growers' association, George Munroe, president of the western section of the Canadian Bankers' association; W. H. McWilliams, of the Grain Exchange, and representatives from the different railways.

Farmers who secure aliens for farm work will have to deposit \$2 with the authorities to cover transportation, and will also have to guarantee the men seven months' work at the current rate of wages, besides supplying them with board and lodging, and reporting to the camp commandant once a month. In case any of the men desert the authorities must be notified immediately.

If necessary 2,000 interned aliens will also be brought west from the camp near Cochrane. The cost of transportation in this case may be borne by the federal government.
