

## INTERNED ALIENS TO GO TO KAPUSKASING CAMP

WILL HAVE HEALTHFUL WORK  
OUTDOORS CLEARING AND  
CULTIVATING LAND.

(Special Despatch to The Globe.)

Ottawa, March 16.—Arrangements are being completed for the immediate transfer of the enemy aliens interned at Fort Henry, Kingston, to the internment camp at Kapuskasing in Northern Ontario. Fort Henry is to be used for military purposes, and the prisoners can be more suitably looked after at Kapuskasing, where they will have open air and healthful exercise in carrying on the work of clearing and cultivating land, begun by the hundreds of Germans and Austrians who were sent there during the early months of the war. Most of these latter are now voluntarily employed under surveillance as laborers in various other parts of the Dominion. Several hundred of them have been sent to work in the coal and iron mines of Nova Scotia.

## German Troops Expelled From Russian Trenches

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

Petrograd, March 16.—An official report to-day says:

"In the region of Stanislaw the enemy attacked our positions and occupied part of our trenches. As a result of counter-attacks by our reserves he was dislodged and driven back to his trenches.

"Attempts of strong enemy scouting detachments to approach our positions at various points were repulsed."
