

## Accidental Death, Verdict in Fred Barratk Death

A Coroner's jury at the Morgue last night returned a verdict of "accidental death" at the inquest into the death of Fred Barratk, the man who was dashed to death when his clothing caught in a revolving pulley at the Simpson Knitting Mills a week ago. Barratk was standing on an improvised scaffold when the accident occurred, and in the evidence submitted it was shown that the pulley which caught his clothing was ordinarily not in a dangerous position.

## Bulgar Finds Himself in Peculiar Situation

To have been arrested as an enemy alien and placed in an **internment** camp at Kapuskasing, after serving overseas with the First Canadian Contingent and spending six months in the front line, is the peculiar situation in which an unnaturalized Bulgarian, D. Joroff by name, finds himself, according to a letter received from him by W. E. Turley, Provincial Secretary of the G. W. V. A.

Joroff, who claims to have been honorably discharged and granted a service button previous to his arrest, is now afraid that he will be deported to his own country, where he will be liable to the death penalty for having served with the C. E. F.

## Prepayment Cars Will Run on Yonge Street

On Monday **pay-as-you-enter** cars will be introduced on the Yonge street route. These cars have been used only on a couple of the city car runs as yet and this will give them their first test in **Toronto** of handling big crowds.

The cars have worked well on other routes and it is felt that they will help to handle the heavy traffic on Yonge street in a more satisfactory manner than the ordinary cars.

## JAIL TERM LENGTHENED.

With but thirteen days of his 60-day term to serve, Walter Heintzman escaped from the Jail Farm. Heintzman was captured and yesterday brought before Judge Denton to answer to the charge of escaping from custody. Now he will have six months to serve.
