

# SAYERS CASE WAS ADJOURNED TO GET FURTHER EVIDENCE

Case Will Probably Stand  
Over Until the Assizes  
in June.

Robert Sayers was remanded until Nov. 5 for further evidence on a charge of treason before Magistrate Elliott at the police court Saturday afternoon.

In his statement Sayers admitted carrying Austrians across the river in a row boat on three different occasions, but stated that he did not know they wished to avoid the military authorities, but was told that they wanted to get past the American Immigration authorities.

Quite a number of Austrians have been disappearing, and Col. Penhorwood and the local authorities have reason to believe that a regular underground railway is being operated to spirit these men out of the country. They are endeavoring now to locate the moving spirit behind the conspiracy.

Pete Boric and George Lopic, two Austrians who were taken across the river about three weeks ago and were later apprehended and brought back here, were examined, but their evidence was of a very unsatisfactory nature as they contradicted themselves and each other back and forward continually. According to Lopic's story the expedition was conducted by Boric, and the latter's evidence, although very confusing, tended to confirm that. Although he told a number of stories Boric maintained throughout that no one had directed him where to go, or what steps to take to avoid the authorities.

The tales of the two men show that after being taken across the river they took the street car, and getting off at the station in the Michigan Soo stepped into a saloon on the corner kept by a Pole. From there they went to a Horowat boarding house where they spent the night. The following morning they were taken by automobile eighteen miles out the Soo line with the idea of avoiding being apprehended by the police at the Michigan Soo station.

Neither man would identify Sayers as the man who took them across the river.

Mr. Uriah McFadden, who appeared for the prisoner, told the court he would do what he could to assist in locating the director of the suspected underground railway.
