

A HUNDRED SUSPECTS

REMOVED FROM FORT HENRY TO PETAWAWA.

Where They Will Be Put to Work—
Belleville Expects to Have 500
Soldiers Quartered There.

Exactly one hundred of the suspects confined to Fort Henry were transferred to Petawawa on the 11.25 C. P. R. train on Thursday morning. At half past ten o'clock the squad of prisoners, in charge of twenty-five of the 14th guard under Lieut. W. Swaine, were marched over from Barrie field to the city. The foreigners had previously been supplied with heavy sheep-skin lined coats, and other items of heavy clothing. At the city station they were loaded into two coaches at the front of the train and a guard mounted at each end of the coaches. Each of the guards had a loaded rifle but the quiet demeanor of the foreigners made such a precaution seem almost unnecessary. They are all foreigners of the class that work on the railroads in the summer and in factories or nowhere in the cities during the winter. The only regret that they seem to have is being deprived of liquor as they can smoke if they have the money to buy the tobacco.

They are being taken to Petawawa to build additional camps for the numbers of foreigners who are being held in Toronto and Montreal, because there is no place to send them. Fort Henry is crowded even with the loss of this hundred and it is unlikely that the number who left to-day will be brought back.
