

# AUSTRIANS INTERNED

## One Hundred Arrive at Petawawa Camp from Kingston.

PETAWAWA, Ont., Dec. 10.—One hundred Austrians, who are prisoners of war, arrived here today from Fort Henry, Kingston. The prisoners were conveyed by special train to Sharbot Lake, under a guard from the 14th Regiment of Kingston, in charge of Lieut. Swayne. At Sharbot Lake the prisoners were turned over to Col. J. M. Balderson, commander of the 42nd Regiment of Lanark and Renfrew, who had received orders to supply a guard of one hundred men from his regiment for duty at Petawawa.

The train did not reach here un-

til late in the evening, but Major de la Ronde, provost marshal, was at the depot and led the prisoners to their respective quarters, which are exceedingly comfortable, considering the limited time at the major's disposal and will be much improved in a day or two. Col. Balderson furnished an exceptionally smart guard of young men of fine physique. In addition to the hundred men now here, the 42nd Regiment has already more than 300 men with the first and second Overseas contingent. It is a creditable showing and a tribute to the commanding officer. His officers in charge here are Capt. J. H. Edwards of Carleton Place, Capt. E. J. Watt of Perth, and Lieut. R. M. Watson of Smith's Falls, with Lieut. S. W. Gilroy, of the latter place, next for duty. Another special train of prisoners will arrive here from Montreal tomorrow.
