

# BOYS IN KHAKI RESENT 'GERMAN'

## They Remove the Word From the Window of a Town Printing Plant

Monday evening an unusual scene was presented upon our streets.

Somewhere about 8 o'clock that evening a crowd of some two or three hundred began to congregate in front of "The German Post" printing office. In the centre were a half dozen or so of soldiers, who are preparing themselves specially to go abroad and fight the Germans. Their eyes instantly spotted the word "German" upon the window, and, of course, acting on the impulses that their special training inspires, they resented its appearance and determined that that window was no place for it.

With little ceremony they removed the words "German Post" and after turning the event into a recruiting meeting, they went their way.

The writer interviewed Mr. Christiansen on the subject and found that he is not taking the affair very seriously. He looks upon the work as that of a few drunken soldiers.

He stated that if the Mayor or a member of the council or an officer of the town had come to him and intimated that the sign was objectionable and that in the interests of peace it had better be removed he would have moved it, but at the same time he believes it is his right to have the sign there if he so wishes.

It is his intention, he states, to remove the sign over the upper part of his premises.
