

Two Austrians named Gelsch and Miskow were fined for having liquor in a place other than in their homes. The two men were employed by the G. P. R. and live with two other men in a box car on a railway siding at Smiths Falls. Officials raided the car and found four big bottles of liquor in it, which they confiscated. A charge was laid against them of violating the liquor act and they were defended by C. J. Foy of Perth, who urged that the box car was their home, the only home they had, and that they were entitled to have the liquor there. Under the law liquor may not be kept in a boarding house. There were four men living in this car doing their own cooking etc.; and it was considered a boarding house. The magistrate imposed a fine of \$200 and costs on each.
