

Large Batch Of War Prisoners

Specially Conveyed to Toronto This Morning

CALLED TO THE FRONT Or "EUROPE AT WAR."

A stirring war feature, successfully secured under difficult circumstances by Manager Huttlemeyer, will fill the bill tonight and tomorrow at the Queen Theatre. It is a thoroughly good film, full of adventure, exciting scenes, and of thoroughly wholesome interest from beginning to end. Together with the splendid vaudeville turn of Brown and Hackett, which Mr. Huttlemeyer has engaged for the last three days of the week, such a programme should not fail to draw crowds tonight and tomorrow afternoon and evening.

Captain Cameron, with the assistance of twelve men of the 44th, conducted 21 German and Austrian prisoners of war to the G.T.R. train this morning for Toronto. As usual, the prisoners were locked in the waiting room prior to the arrival of the train, the doors being guarded by soldiers with live bayonets.

All the prisoners seemed to be of bright, intelligent appearance and some were fairly well dressed. When the 7.30 train arrived all smartly fell into rank and filed into the special car without any trouble or delay. It is expected they will be confined in Stanley barracks.
