

INTERNEED ALIENS ON THEIR WAY TO PETEWAWA CAMP

**One Hundred Are Sent From
Montreal—Other Plans
Being Made**

**CITY REGISTRATION
TO BEGIN MONDAY**

**Inspector Jennings of R.N.W.
M.P. Will Conduct Duties
in Edmonton District**

OTTAWA, Ont., Dec. 10.—The beginning was made today in moving the interned Austrians, Germans and Turks to the scene of the employment that is being provided for them. One hundred were sent from Montreal to Petawawa camp, and a similar number sent from Kingston. It is intended to bring 300 men in all to Petawawa, where they will be engaged at road making and other work. In a week or ten days men will also be sent from Montreal to Parent, on the National Transcontinental, 300 miles west of the city of Quebec. Here they will be employed cutting roads through the woods and clearing the timber off lands that will afterwards be suitable for farming and on which many of these men will probably settle.

The arrangements for sending the men up to Parent have not yet been completed nor have the similar arrangements which it is understood are being made with the Ontario government for colonization work along the National Transcontinental west of Cochrane. Although Premier Hearst, who was here yesterday would say nothing about the matter, it is understood that his visit was made for the purpose of working out the proposed scheme as part of the plans for the development of New Ontario.

Gen. Sir William Otter is in Montreal today in connection with the sending of the first contingent of these men to Petawawa.
