

GERMANS HERE ALSO ORDERED TO RETURN HOME

Difficult to See How They
Can Do So Now With
War Declared.

BELGIANS EAGER FOR THE FRAY

Throng Consulate Request-
ing They Be Sent Back
to Fight Germany.

The German chancellor, Wm. Berg-
holdt, who, in the absence of Dr.
Lang, is in charge of the Imperial
German consulate in this city, in-
formed The Star this afternoon that
he had received official instructions
giving notice of the recall from Can-
ada of all Germans liable to do mili-
tary service.

How they are to leave Canada is a
problem, however, as they cannot go
by ship from a Canadian port, and
if they endeavor to cross the border
into the States will be held up by the
immigration authorities.

Stirring scenes were witnessed to-
day at the offices of the Belgian
Consul, Clarence De Sola, where as
early as five o'clock bodies of Bel-
gians began to congregate demand-
ing to be sent back to fight against
the Germans. The men are furious
at the reported inroad of the Ger-
mans into Belgium, and they are lit-
erally clamoring to be sent back.
Pages and pages of names and ad-
dresses have been registered at the
Consul's office, the list including
chaffeurs, car conductors, artisans,
and laborers, practically all of whom
have had military training.

"The outbreak of patriotism on the
part of the Belgians seems incredi-
ble," said an official this morning.
"One big Belgian addressed the gath-
ering, declaring that if there was
such a thing as justice in the world
then cold premeditated attack upon
Belgium by the German emperor
should be punished.

"I am anticipating that a British
army will quickly be landed in Bel-
gium," said another well-known rep-
resentative of Belgium in the city to
a Star representative this morning
"and unless I am mistaken Germany
will meet her 'Waterloo' on Belgian
territory. The British Army al-
ready bear upon its standards 'Onde-
narde' and 'Malplagnet,' the glorious
victories of Marlborough, and I think
there will soon be more."

This afternoon a Star representa-
tive called on the Belgian Consul
who admitted that there had been an
interesting scene at the consulate
this morning, and indeed, at his pri-
vate residence, so anxious did the
Belgian community seem to be to get
back in defence of their Fatherland.
The men, said Mr. De Sola, seemed
unable to wait for the official call to
arms, but, he added, "I can do no-
thing until I get official instructions.
There are now 200,000 men behind the
guns, and the Government feels that
that is sufficient for the present."

By a curious coincidence the Aus-
trian and the Belgian Consulates
are both in the same building,
the *Cristine*, one on the front
and the other on the second floor,
while directly opposite in the same
street is the Russian Consulate.
This morning there have been nu-
merous callers at all three offices,
and there is more or less com-
mingling of the men of all nation-
alities, but so far there has been
no disturbance.
