NINE ALIENS HAVE BEEN INTERNED

Sequel To May Day Speeches
By Socialists Came Very
Quickly

LICENSES RESCINDED

All Were Austrians Who Enjoyed Parole During War—Sent To Camp Kapukasing

As a sequel to the May Day demonstrations on the Champ de Mars,
and in a public meeting held at
night, when certain indiscreet aliens
evinced too much sympathy with the
lands they had turned their backs
upon in by-gone years, nine of them
have been arrested by Capt. J. N.
Carter, registrar of enemy aliens,
and are being interned.

Some of these men were taken on

Thursday evening, and were promptly sent off by train under escort to Camp Kapukasing in Northern Ontario, in the quiet solitudes of which undeveloped area they will have the opportunity of studying life without those blessings of a civilization, which they are so prone to denounce. More of the men were rounded up yesterday, and they will follow their comrades of the red flag.

These men are all Austrians who

have enjoyed liberty on parole during the war, reporting regularly to
the aliens' office on St. Antoine
street. Having abused that provisional liberty, their licenses have
been rescinded.

"We are not going to stand for

Carter, "and if these people, after being given liberty although they were alien enemies, begin to create trouble in the country which has afforded them protection and shelter, and which allowed them to get good jobs while our own men went overseas to fight, then we think it is time to put a stop to such conduct."

ed by a bomb placed in the office of Burgess Charles H. Storey, wrecked the municipal buildings and shattered windows for several blocks in the business district here early today. The damage is estimated at many thousands of dollars. A score of prisoners, trapped in the jail in the basement of the building, a three-storey brick structure, which collapsed over them, were rescued by firemen: Police and agents of the Department of Justice said they believed the explosion an anarchist May Day plot.
