

GERMANS ESCAPE FROM CAMP AT AMHERST.

AMHERST, Aug. 30—Two German prisoners escaped from the Internment Camp on the Highlands, this morning. How the interned Huns managed to elude the sentries and penetrate the barb wire entanglements is a mystery to the officers at the Camp, but in some manner the Teutons did so. They crossed over Park Street, went through a field of oats and into the nearby woods. A. Peters and T. Reana are the men, who made the escape. Both speak English. The descriptions are as follows:

T. Reana, complexion fair, height five feet, five inches, hair light, eyes blue, right eye slightly crossed, defective, weight 150 pounds, tattoo marks on both arms, wearing a dark blue suit.

A. Peters, good appearance, complexion fair, hair light, eyes grayish blue, height five feet, eight inches, inclined to be stout, 180 pounds, wearing dark blue suit.

Since the last escape from the Experimental Farm the Teutonic prisoners have been conducting themselves with the utmost decorum. The fate that their comrades met has evidently deterred them from making the plunge. At the present time, however, they can only go into hiding and will be caught sooner or later. All modes of exit from the country are now closely guarded, and the United States hardly offers them a refuge as in former times. Col Morris has a large armed force out scouring the countryside, and it is understood tonight that a clue has been discovered relative to the whereabouts of the Germans.
