CAMPEAU WOUNDED

Lieut. Victor Campeau Is in
Hospital With Gunshot
Wound in Knee

WOUNDED ON BIRTHDAY

Pte. Wm. Bond Has Twice Ap-
peared in Casualty Lists,
Each Time on His
Birthday

Chief of Police Campeau received word yesterday that his son, Lieut. Victor Campeau, was in the British Red Cross Hospital in Wimereux, France, suffering from a severe gunshot wound in the knee. He was admitted to the hospital on Monday and it is thought he must have been wounded in the battle in which the Canadians captured Passchendaele Spur last Saturday. Lieut. Campeau enlisted with the battalion commanded by Lieut.-Col. Dansereau. He went with the battalion to St. John, N.B., but, while in command of a company at the internment camp at Amherst, N.S., caught a severe cold that developed into rheumatism. He was in hospital for a while and was sent home, being laid up for four months. When he had recovered he crossed to England, where he rejoined his regiment and was later transferred to the original French-Canadian battalion and sent to France. During the past few months he has gone through most of the severe fighting in which the Canadians have been engaged without being wounded, until he was shot in the knee Saturday, when scores of the brave Canadians fell when Passchendaele Spur was taken from the Germans. Lieut. Campeau, who is twenty-eight years of age, was connected with the Garrison Artillery for three years before the breaking out of the war. He is unmarried and before going overseas resided with his parents at 43 Esplanade avenue. Chief Campeau hoped last night that the wound was not as severe as reported and sent a cablegram to France for further information as to his son's injury and condition.
