

H.M.S. GLORY MAKES BIG HAUL OF GERMAN RESERVISTS AT SEA

Halifax, Sept. 10.—Halifax has its first prisoners of war in a century with the arrival of H.M.S. Glory, bringing to port the Spanish mail steamer Montserrat, from New York to Genoa with 68 German reservists on board. They were taken to Melville Island prison.

The naval authorities under their instructions could give no information of the capture and the Glory left for sea again. Capt. Pablo Ferrer said about 500 miles from Halifax the Glory stopped his ship about 9 o'clock Monday morning. The battleship signalled the liner to heave to and be searched, and a few minutes afterward a lieutenant from the British ship was on board and examining the Montserrat's passenger list, when he found a suspiciously large number of German it. Making inquiries he asno-sen names on it. Making inquiries, he ascertained they were German reservists who were bound for Genoa, and as it would be quite easy for them to reach their colors by way of neutral Italy, the captain of the Glory ordered the Montserrat to go with him to Halifax.

The Glory kept in company with her prize all day and trained her searchlights on the Montserrat at night.
