

MIKE COULDN'T KEEP AWAY FROM TORONTO

Now He Must Do Six Months
in Jail for Breaking
Parole.

POLICE COURT CASES

Amusing Instance of How Names
are Changed Speedily
in Court.

Just one year ago Mike Fallon, 46 years of age, was sentenced to two years on the Industrial Farm. After finishing one year's "time" Fallon promised Superintendent Findlay that he would go to Welland, Ont., where there was work to do, and to stay away from Toronto for one year—the time of his parole.

That was about the middle of April that he was let out. He came straight to Toronto, and, according to Constable Tom Sullivan, has been hanging around Simcoe and York streets.

"Have you done any work while you have been here?"

"No," said Fallon.

"But you can't keep me in jail all the time," added Fallon.

Squire Ellis decided that point by fining Fallon \$50 and costs or six months in jail, on a vagrancy count.

Refused to Pay \$4 Bill.

Robert Lee of 694 Crawford street, was picked up at the back door of an hotel after midnight last night and driven to his home in a hack. There he refused to pay his bill, gauged at \$4. The hack driver then called a policeman. Lee pleaded guilty to being drunk and said he would pay the hack driver. He was fined \$5 and costs or 15 days.

David Doust, an elderly man, with the venerable appearance of a parson, pleaded guilty to having been drunk, and was let go with his friends.

John Sullivan, drunk, fell into \$2.50 worth of eggs and butter belonging to a Jew fruiterer. He was fined \$3 and costs or 15 days.

Alex. Hay was fined \$5 and costs or 15 days for being drunk in charge of a buggy.

How Names are Changed.

Charged with being drunk, Mike Carp was called from the clerk's desk. The policeman at the dock, ten feet from the clerk, shouted "Clarke."

The man at the courtroom door, six feet from the dock, yelled "Shark."

Mr. Carp recognized himself in the guise of the fiercer fish, and came forth. But many a time, Smith becomes Jones in this calling of names, or McKay into Cholomondeley, or Brown in Colquhoun.

Samuel Inman, caught in the railway yards of the Grand Trunk Railway, said he was drunk, and was trying to catch a freight train for Hamilton. He was fined \$1 and costs or 15 days.

Employment Agent Held.

Kynos Kyonoff, a Bulgarian, of 404 King street east, was remanded till to-morrow on a charge of engaging in the business of an intelligence agent, and dealing with immigrants without having a license from the Immigration Department. It is alleged that Kyonoff got \$10 each from six men for getting them jobs at Marmora, Ontario.

The charge is laid by James C. Mitchell, inspector of employment agents for Ontario, and by D. H. Reynolds, traveling immigration inspector, who are both pressing a hot campaign against illegal agencies in Toronto. They have sworn out no less than 16 informations against local agents, to be answered in to-morrow afternoon's Police Court.

Emilio Raffaleo, an Italian, was fined \$50 and costs or 90 days for indecency.

Would Have to Work at a Home.

Charles Dalbey, 62 years old, asked to be sent to jail for a month.

"Wouldn't you prefer to go to one of the old folks' homes?"

"No. I'd have to work there," said Dolby.

He was fined \$1 or 30 days.

The father of Thomas Blunt said that Thomas was the kind of man who, when sent out on a message, failed to return the change. Thomas, charged with vagrancy, was ordered to keep away from home.

Stanley Cross was sent to jail for five days on a charge of stealing \$16.31 from Peter Shaver, for whom Cross worked as a milk driver.

Robert E. Lister and Bert Grant

arrested by Constable John Beach, were remanded a week on \$200 bail on a charge of stealing hay from bonded cars of the Grand Trunk Railway.

The Cloakmakers' Trouble.

The striking cloakmakers have caused trouble to the police for over a month now, but the disturbances seem to have reached a culmination in the attack last night on Dave Cohen, the private detective, well-known in Toronto, who to-day charged Morris Golinsky with assault and wounding, and who, armed with warrants for four unknown men and a number of city police, is looking for the others who attacked him.

Dave Cohen, who is manager for the Duncan Detective Agency, alleges that Golinsky hit him over the head with an iron rod, inflicting a cut that required five stitches at the General Hospital. Golinsky was remanded till to-morrow.

Kelinan Kleinman, charged with assaulting Bernard Sutin, was also remanded till to-morrow.

The charge of criminal negligence against Sam Weirnerman, owner of the Independent Cloak Company's building, whose walls fell killing two men, was changed to-day to a charge of manslaughter, and without any preliminary investigation, he was sent up to a jury.
