

NO MAIL TO GERMANY ✓

Postmaster Moffat informs The Observer that he has received a circular from the Post Office Department instructing him to accept no mail matter for transmission to Germany, Austria or Luxemburg. The reason for this is obvious. There is now no communication between Canada and these countries, while even if there was it is improbable that letters would be transmitted during a time of war. It will mean considerable hardship to the large German population in this district, who will now and until the war is over be cut off from all communication with their friends in the old land, but it is one of the inevitable consequences of the war and as such no fault can be found with the Canadian authorities. Any mail matter dropped in the street letter boxes or the boxes in the post office will be sent to the dead letter office.
