

EMPLOYING OF ALIENS IN NORTHERN ONTARIO

THAT LIKELY TO BE OUTCOME OF PREMIER HEARST'S OTTAWA VISIT.

Ottawa, Dec. 9.—Premier Hearst of Ontario, who was in Ottawa to-day attending an Executive meeting of the Canadian Peace Centenary Association, had a conference with Premier Borden in reference to the problem of the German and Austrian enemies now under custody or surveillance in Ontario, numbering upwards of one thousand. It is understood that arrangements will be made for putting these men at work under proper guard, in Northern Ontario, clearing lands and building roads. They will thus be made to earn their keep while the war lasts, and will be performing useful and necessary development work for the Province.

Premier Hearst left for Toronto to-night in company with Mr. R. R. Gamey, M.P.P. Although, of course, Mr. Hearst declined to discuss the question of coming changes in his Cabinet, it is understood that the matter was discussed to-day with Premier Borden and Hon. Frank Cochrane, whose advice was sought.

GIBB TO SUPERVISE BRITISH ARMY CONTRACTS

CHAIRMAN OF METROPOLITAN RAILWAYS IN LONDON PLACED ON ARMY COUNCIL.

London, Dec. 9.—Sir George S. Gibb, Chairman of the Metropolitan District Railway Company and of the tube railways, has been appointed a civil member of the Army Council, and will be charged with the supervision of army contracts. This appointment of a business man of great experience to control the contracts has been made because of criticism arising out of the alleged action of some contractors in supplying inferior articles to the army.

SIR ROBERT POSTPONES TRIP.

State Affairs Keep Him From Going East

FIRST MATE'S BODY FOUND.

Arvid Ohman, of Curtis, Identified by Letters and Tattoo Marks.

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., Dec. 9.—Encased in a solid block of blue ice, the body of a man, later identified as that of Arvid Ohman, first mate of the steamer Curtis, lost in a recent marine disaster on Lake Superior, was found to-day twenty miles below Grand Marais, where the Petersen and Curtis went to pieces. Identification was established by means of letters in the clothing and tattoo marks on the body. The body will be brought here. There are still eleven bodies lying in the local marine morgue.
