Thousands of Bulgarians Coming to Canada

AGENTS WENT AFTER THEM

Railway Construction Delayed by Reason of Their Absence—Vessels Chartered to Bring Them Back to Work.

According to local steamship agencles the continental steamship lines! will bring between twelve and fifteen thousand Bulgarians to America during June and July. Two-thirds of these people formerly resided in Canada and the United States, but when hostilities broke out in the Balkan States they returned to their native land to fight for their country. Tt is estimated that about seven thousand Bulgarians left Canada when the war broke out.

The greater part of these were engaged in railway construction work in western Canada. The progress made this year with railway construction work has been hampered to a great extent by reason of the absence of foreign laborers. Railway contractors have experienced great difficulty in filling the places of the foreigners, who are hardened to the work and hardships, conditions which keep the native laborer from atten compete with the foreigner. attempting to

Now that the war is practically over several agents representing Canadian railway contractors. despatched to Bulgaria several weeks ago, have arranged to bring back nearly all the Bulgarians who left here several Bulgarians who The agents have char-continental vessels to months ago. tered several continental vessels to carry the foreigners, and in addition have made complete reservations of trains for the transporting of the foreigners on ocean liners landing at Montreal and Portland, Me.

Local agents say that travel generally so far this year has been very large, especially from across the Atlantic.
