Reid at the Presbyterian Con-gress, the foreigners of Canada fur-nish twice as many criminals, two and a' third times' as many insane, and three times as many paupers as the native element. Instead of bonusing the S.S. companies to secure immi-grants we shall soon be obliged to follow the example of the United States and demand a poll tax. Our Government has already spent millions in bonuses, and the time has come when this system should be re-vised, for it is a temptation to immi-gration agents to send us undesir-ables. We should insist upon more strin-gent rules at our ports of entry. In fact, it is at the shipping port that these examinations should be held. Many an unfortunate immigrant who has spent his savings to get to Can-ada is turned back when he reaches our shores; whereas, if he had been put through a strict examination at his home port he would have been spared this humiliation.
