

GREAT CAMP AT PETAWAWA.

Three Branches of The Service, Numbering 12,000 Men, Will Gather

Ottawa, May 23.—Petawawa camp during the latter part of June, will have the largest mobilization in the history of Canada, with upwards of 12,000 cavalry, infantry and artillery. Hitherto there has been little of this kind of training, the various branches of the military usually coming separately to the camp.

On June 13th about 8,000 infantry and cavalry, drawn from an area extending from Bowmanville on the west to Sherbrooke on the east, will be moved into Petawawa, it is expected, in twenty-four hours. This will include the loading of twenty trains of 300 cars, the detraining of the troops, and the removal of the cars.

A secondary mobilization will take place on June 20, when about 4,000 city corps, drawn from an area extending from Hamilton to Sherbrooke, Que., will be brought to camp for five days' training, during which two days will be spent in the combined training of a body of seven regiments of cavalry, three or more brigades of artillery, and three brigades of infantry.

Colonel Hughes will personally supervise the manoeuvres.
