First Lot of Austrians to Sail To-morrow

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

Montreal, July 30.—The German steamer Willshad, now in port from Rotterdam and Antwerp, will carry back to Europe the first batch of Austrians to sail from Montreal for the seat of war. When the vessel clears from this port Saturday or Sunday morning there will be at least two hundred of the local Austrians on board. Five thousand Austrians in Montreal are supposed to answer the call of their Sovereign, for they are in the first and second reservist divisions. Quite a number of the colony have become British subjects and are exempt from military service in the conflict.

Austrian labor agencies are crowded to-day. On the door of each agency is posted in a conspicuous place the order from the local Consulrequiring the first reservists to leave for home at once.

CARPENTERS GIVE IN.

London, Ont., July 30.—Some two hundred un'on carpenters of this city, who have been on strike for two months for a minimum wage of 40 cents an hour, to-day gave up the fight and have been told to go back to work if they care to. Although the minimum wage here is said to be the lowest in Canada, the hosses remained firm throughout, and also remained firm throughout, and also recused to recognize the union. Scores of non-union carpenters have been brought into the city, and many of the union men now find themselves out of work. It is figured that the strike has cost the union over \$10.000, appart from the loss of wages to the men.
