MANY RELIEF CASES.

Over Seven Hundred Received Help From City in July.

City Relief Officer Coyell's report for July shows that 768 cases were dealt with during the month, and 727 of these received relief. Applicants numbered 381 males and 857 femaies. Out of 620 applications for admission to homes from 299 males and 321 femaies, 597 were approved. Eight males and one femaie were sent to infants homes. Out of 81 applicants, 67 were given assistance. Twenty-three persons were deported, 15 males and 8 femaies.
