ARMS AND AMMUNITION SEIZED IN BRANTFORD

AUSTRIAN CONSUL SAYS IT WAS FOR HUNTING TRIP TO THE WEST,

Brantford, Aug. 10.—The local police at an early hour this morning, at a foreigners boarding-house at 28
Pearl street, where a large number of Austrians and Hungarians have their headquarters, seized a quantity of arms and ammunition. Packed away in boxes ready for shipment were found 1,000 rounds of ammunition, three shotguns, two rifles, two revolvers, two pairs of field glasses, two pairs of brown leggings, two cartridge belts, two provision bags, two uniforms, four rifle cases and one focketbook.

Three of the occupants of the house, John Tekag, Jas. Kirczhiezner and Geo. Pergc, were arrested on a charge of concealing weapons and ammunition, they, as far as the police were able to learn, being the heads of the Hungarian colony. The police say that they have information that there is a Hungarian Society in Canada, with headquarters in Welland. The men appeared in the Police Court this morning, and will be held pending further investigation.

The Austrian Consul, D. Katz, stated to your correspondent that the men were going on a hunting trip to the west, and bought the rilles, revolvers and ammunition from W. G. Hawthorne, and the uniforms from "The Big 22" and Grafton store here for this purpose. He stated that two of the three were Canadians, and three months ago were given introductions by Dr. W. Nichol to his son in the west.
