

NO PERSONAL ENMITY IS FELT

German Consul Acknowledges Official
Courtesy in Winnipeg—Had Invita-
tion from Lieut. Governor.

St. Paul, Minn., Aug. 10.—Baron Rued Von Collenberg, German consul-general at Winnipeg, who was given his passports last week by the Canadian government and requested to leave Canada within twenty-four hours, yesterday set at rest reports coming out of Winnipeg, that the United States consul-general, Frank Dillingham, had refused to take over the duties of the German consul-general at Winnipeg.

Baron Von Collenberg told Consul Grunow there is no personal feeling of enmity between the baron and the officials of Winnipeg and Manitoba, and the governor of Manitoba invited Baron Von Collenberg to dine with him the night he left Winnipeg.

Baron Von Collenberg said the more conservative citizens of Canada are on friendly terms with the German-American residents of Canada, and that a few hot-heads are responsible for the outbreaks.

The problem of the disposition of German reservists in Canada has not been solved, according to Consul Grunow.
