

14th Goes Into Port.

On Thursday morning at ten o'clock, Col. T. D. R. Hemming, officer in command of the division, gave orders to Major H. J. Dawson, commanding the 14th Regiment to take over Fort Henry at once, as the R. C. H. A. has received orders to take its guard off.

At the present time, the 14th Regiment has about one hundred and fifty men doing duty at the different points around the city and Barrielfield. The order received on Thursday morning means that the present guard will have to be increased by about forty men. Twelve men and one non-commissioned officer is on duty for a period of twenty-four hours and then on for forty-eight hours.

The men who are doing the duty at the present time report that they are enjoying themselves. For the first couple of days the rations served were not any too good, but those conditions have been removed and the men have no complaints to offer. The officers on duty are being served with their meals at the Country Club house.

Up until the present time it is not known whether or not the 14th guard will be stationed in the fort or in tents outside of the fort. A few days ago the water service was connected into the fort for the use of the men who are on duty. The water was examined by Lieut.-Col. H. R. Duff, medical officer of the division.
