Germans and Austrians Working At Springhill Make A Worthy Appeal

The following has been sent to The Morning Chronicle for publication:

GERMANS AND AUSTRIANS IN CANADA DURING THE EURO- PEAN WAR.

To whomsoever it may concern:
We, the undersigned Germans and Austrians of Springhill Mines, Nova Scotia, Canada, desire to assure the citizens of Springhill and the Canadian Government of our deep regret that the country of our birth and the country of our adoption are now at war. We do not wish to see the war carried into Canada: we simply ask to be given a fair chance to gain an honest livelihood here; and, as civilians, we are anxious above all things to disclaim any evil intentions to

ward our neighbors in this land.
