## PRISONERS OF WAR REACHED HALIFAX

Were Captured Aboard Steamer Returning to Fight in the War for Germany. SENT TO MELVILLE ISLAND.

## Halifax, N.S., Sept. 9.—Halifax has

its first prisoners of war in a century with the arrival of H.M.S. Glory, bringing to port the Spanish mail

steamer Montzerrat from New York to Genoa with 68 German reservists on board. They were taken to Mel-

ville Island prison.
