

MONEY NOT BEING SENT AWAY FROM SAULT THIS MONTH

**Not So Much Available, and
Emigrants Cannot Send
What They Have Away.**

Usually at this time of the month there will be found a large crowd around the money wicket of the Post Office, but this month this condition has not existed. One reason for this is that the pay roll at the Lake Superior Corporation was not as large as usual, and then the Italians and the Austrians, who comprise the larger part of the Sault's foreign population, cannot under the war regulations send money home. Austria being at war with the British Empire the sending of money there from British territory is prohibited, and as the position of Italy is not yet defined the same conditions exist.

On the other hand there has been a slight increase in the amount of funds being transferred to Great Britain by means of Post Office money orders. Not many Russians, however, are availing themselves of the opportunity to send money to Russia, and there are very few money orders sent from the Sault to France at any time.

The fact that the Austrian and Italian sections of the population cannot send money away has cut the amount of money sent out of the Sault in the week after payday to less than one quarter the usual sum.
