WORK SWISS PASSPORT TO GERMAN SOLDIER

Paroled Reservist of Enemy Seeks Clever Escape

FOILED BY PROMPT ARREST

Teuton and His Companion Speedily Escorted Back to Stanley Barracks —Sought Ticket at the Swigs Consulate.

Under an armed escort from Stanley Barracks, Karl Ern and Richard Kramer, two German army reservists, one of whom was on parole from the local Police Department until the cessation of hostilities, were taken to Stanley Barracks on Saturday morning.

Officer's Prompt Action,

Their arrest was due to Constable Godfrey Maurer of the Headquarters Staff, who is investigating the standing of forelgners and questioning them regarding their sentiments. Daily he brings men to the detective office, who have all accepted the terms offered by the Inspector of Detectives.

Using Swiss Passport.

Among those who accepted 'the parole offered by the pollce was Ern. Saturday morning, while in the Swiss Consulate, Constable Maurer noticed Ern, who had presented a passport belonging to a Swiss named Fritz Scheinder. He explained that he wished to go to the United States to see his wife and children. Maurer recognized him, however, and im-

Ern had apparently obtained the passport in some unknown manner, and that he had intended to give it to his friend Kramer that the latter might leave the country and go to Germany.
