THE JAILER'S REPORT THAT 206 PRISONERS SHOWS WERE COMMITTED During the Past Year-Occupations,

Religious Beliefs and Nationalities Of the Law Breakers.

The annual report of the jati governor shows an increase over last year of fourteen prisoners com-mitted. There were 206 prisoners— 196 males and 10 females commit-

ted for the year ending September 20th. These divided as to the number of time committed show the fol

lowing figure: Committed for the first time 156 males and 7 females; second time 18 males and 2 females; third time

8 males and one female; 14 males committed for more than the third time There were 220 prisoners in cus-

tody during the year with 12 males and I female remaining in custody on the first of October.

The nationalities of the prisoners committed were: Canadian 130; English, 36; Irish, 15; Scotch, 12;

United States, 5; other countries, 8.

The religious denomination of the prisoners were: Roman Catholic, 88; Church of England, 61; Presbyteri-an 30; Methodist, 21; other de-

nominations, G. There were 60 males and 7 fe-males married of the 196 males and ten females committed. The cash revenue derived from the

prison labor was \$1,409.15, the prisoners being engaged in making tile, sawing wood, breaking stone, knittfng, sewing, etc. It costs 12 1-2

cents a day to feed each prisoner.
The number of prisoners confined in the jail varied from twenty-five five There were 109 men and three

women sentenced for being drunk and disorderly, other offences being abusive and obscene language, assault, (nine), carrying unlawful weapons, indecency, larceny, (sev-

en). vagrancy, (thirty-six), and other offences. Laborers are the greatest offend-

ers against the community, there being 133 committed during the

past year from this class. Only five of those committed gave no occupation. Nearly all the trades are

represented, varying from clerks, book-keepers and students, to sailors and fishermen.
