COULD PLACE MEN IN PULP WOODS

Mr. Speer Has No Men on
List Suitable for this
Work.

GIFTS OF CLOTHING
WOULD BE WELCOME

Of 112 Men Registered, Work
Has Been Found
For Half.

Applications have been received by Mr. C. H. Speers for quite a number of men to go to the woods cutting pulp-wood, and while he has a large number registered with him, none of them are suitable for this class of work. Consequently anyone requiring work and fitted for the woods would be able to secure it by applying to Mr. Speer.

That the committee would welcome gifts of old clothes, if the clothes were in reasonably good shape, was also intimated by Mr. Speer, and it was suggested that, if the citizens would look over their wardrobes and pick out what they could give away, a card to Mr. Speer would bring around someone to collect it. Boots for the children going to school would be particularly useful.

Up to the present 112 men have registered with Mr. Speer as being out of work, and of this number about 25 per cent. have been provided with permanent work, while temporary jobs varying from three to four days to two weeks have been found for another 25 per cent.

In order to assist the committee citizens who require a few days' help for any odd job, such as moving a lawn, cutting wood and so on, or who require a washerwoman or a maid, are requested to call up the secretary, and he will be able to supply some efficient person for the work
