GERMANS BREAK PAROLE: TRY TO LEAVE CANADA

Score of Foreigners Turned Back at Niagara Falls —
Easy to Leave America by Way of
Philadelphia

Twenty Germans and Austrians who were detained by the immigration authorities at Niagara, while attempting to escape into the United States, and from there to make their way to Germany and Austria, brought to Toronto on Saturday afternoon and taken to Stanley Bar-Among those arrested were two German reservists who had on the day previous given their word to the local police that they would make no effort to leave the country to take part in the war. The remainder had been paroled by the police in different Ontario cities.

On Saturday afternoon local de-

d tectives found two Germans in a downtown store purchasing cameras and supplies. They took the men to the detective office for examination, and later allowed them out on purcha-

and later allowed them out on parole. Papers printed in Germany one month ago were found on the men. They had reached Canada, they said, by way of Holland. There was a story in one of the papers to the effect that the German cruisers Goeben and Breslau were still manned by German crews, and that they intended attacking the Russian Black Seaffect.

The police say that letters sent from Germany, found in the rooms of certain local Germans, stated that it was easy to leave the United States by Philadelphia.
