

## TURKS REFUSE TO EAT ARMENIAN BREAD IN JAIL

NEARLY A HUNDRED CONFINED  
IN DUFFERIN RIFLES'  
ARMORIES.

(Special Despatch to The Globe.)

**Brantford, Nov. 10.**—A la suffragette, thirty-six members of the ninety-six **Turks** in the county jail as military prisoners this morning went on hunger-strike. They refused to accept the bread offered to them, which was Armenian bread. The prisoners were in very cramped quarters. There were but twenty-four cells in the county jail, with sixteen regular inmates, so the corridors had to be utilized to house the **Turks**, and they had hardly enough room to lie down. It is expected that they will be taken to Toronto or Kingston within a day or two, and in the meantime they were transferred to the Dufferin Rifles' Armories, a guard of thirty men being set.

The largest number of prisoners previously in the history of the jail was during the Fenian raid, when sixty-six raiders were placed in jail until they could be taken to Toronto. The reason given for the arrest of the **Turks** was the reception of anonymous threatening letters, supposedly from **Turks**, the new Government building being the objective.

## TWO MONTREAL BANDITS IMPRISONED FOR LIFE

**Montreal, Nov. 10.**—Joseph Beauchamp and Israel Bourret, two of the bandits who shot and mortally wounded Constable Honore Bourdon and wounded Constable Guyon, who attempted to capture them while they were escaping in a sleigh after a burglary on the Cote des Neiges road last winter, were this morning sentenced to life imprisonment by Judge La-vergne. Arthur Foucault, found guilty of being an accomplice, was given one year in prison.

Alphonse Foucault, who was with the gang who shot the officers, has not yet been captured.

## THE APPLE MARKETS

**Ottawa, Nov. 10.**—The following information as to the apple market conditions has been received by the fruit branch of the Department of Agriculture:—

**Liverpool.**—There is a slight improvement in the market, Nova Scotian apples selling at 9s 6d to 10s 6d per barrel; Ontario apples, 11s to 12s for No. 1 and 9s to 10s for No. 2. Boxes low. Kelfer pears, 16s to 17s per barrel.

**Manchester.**—The following prices are now being received (wholesale) for No. 1 and No. 2 apples per barrel:—Kings and Baldwins, 11s to 14s; Russets, 12s to 15s; Snows, 10s to 12s; Ben Davis, Blenheim and Greening, 10s to 12s; Ribston, 8s to 10s; Gravenstein, 6s to 10s.

**London.**—Yakima Valley Jonathans, Spitzenberg, Rome Beauty and Winesap selling at 5s to 6s per box. Apple demand is slow. Good pears wanted.

**Montreal.**—Wholesale prices for No. 1 apples are as follows:—Spy, \$3.25; Baldwin, Greening and Russet, \$2.75; Fameuse and McIntosh, \$4.

**Edmonton.**—Prices unchanged. Twenty-three cars arrived last week and shipments this week will be light, as the jobbers all have a large stock of British Columbia apples on hand. Washington fruit will supply the demand from now on, as British Columbia stock has practically all been shipped.

**Okanagan Valley, B.C.**—There are not fifty cars left in the valley. Only a few growers are shipping. Some fruit is being held for higher prices.
