HAMILTON PARKS BOARD | TO LIGHT UP DUNDURN

Wabassa to be Opened Next Season; 2 Turks Arrested; Wany Ballots Spoiled

Hamilton, Nov. 19,-The Parks Board this evening decided to spend \$1,000 towards the cost of paving the lower end of Catharine street to connect with the bay-front park. It also decided to install a lighting system at Dundurn Park at an estimated cost The Hydro Department of \$2,200. will install the system at cost, plus ten per cent. for supervision. Wabassa Park will be opened next season, and the board passed a vote of thanks to T. J. Stewart, M.P., for securing the Government dredge to dredge near the wharf. J. H. Fearnside offered to spend \$250 for each of the next three years towards improving the wharf there if the board would give him exclusive rights there.

To Ask Tenders for Stone.

The matter of obtaining a stone supply was discussed by the Board of Control, and it was decided to call for tenders for a long-term supply.
